# Musings from the Vice President The "Thirst for Learning" Project

ast Summer, Margie Turley from Alpha Iota and a member of the State Educational Excellence Committee, contacted me and asked for help with a chapter project focused on providing textbooks for a school in Africa.

In the fall of 2017, my husband and I went to Ghana as part of a Rotary International Team headed by Walter Hughes, Rotarian. Our mission focused on microflush toilets, clean water and schools. We visited many remote areas to review projects already completed and to recommend projects still to be done.

After Margie's request, I put her in touch with Walter. He introduced her to Tonasunoa Elementary school in Ghana. Alpha Iota heard about Tonasunoa Elementary School at their September 11 meeting. This school, built by a church in Virginia and dedicated in February of 2017, does not have enough money for textbooks or library books. Rotary had already put in two boreholes for water. Another school being built in the Tain District in the Brong Ahafo region of Ghana is the Tainono Elementary School. Our Rotary group was driven to this site over nearly impassable roads and streams. Until the school is finished, children over twelve years of age walk six miles each way to attend school. Children under twelve do not go to school. The younger children get some instruction around the campfire at night. There is no electricity. The new school will have solar lights.

The Beckley Rotary Club and other Rotary clubs have donated money to help build the Tainono Elementary School. The school will have six classrooms and be supplied with books, desks, chairs, and tables. The total project budget is \$60,000. Both Tonasuno, Tainono and other schools still need textbooks and library books. What better way than a partnership between Rotary and Delta Kappa Gamma to provide books to schools in Africa? This is how DKG can help.

Alpha Iota has shared a creative money-raising project with me as well as several members of nearby chapters. Margie sent me a small water bottle that has been transformed into a "Thirst for Learning" bottle. When filled with dimes, this bottle holds \$100. Alpha Iota has one full bottle and hopes to have another to share during the Founder's Day Luncheon at our state convention. Beta Chapter, Tau Chapter and Xi Chapter are also participating. Xi has filled a bottle and I am sure that Beta and Tau will have bottles too. The bottles are passed around at chapter meetings and find themselves going to Rotary meetings, Mahjong games (lots of dimes appear when we play), book clubs, Margie's Philanthropic Educational Organization and other community events. With this project, not only do we spread the word about Delta Kappa Gamma, we raise money for textbooks and library books for Ghan

Alpha Iota, the chapter spearheading this project, will collect all bottles and send a check each year to Walter Hughes. If you want more information about our partnership with Rotary International, con-

Alpha Iota, Beta, Tau and Xi chapter wish to share this project idea with all of the chapters in West Virginia. It is our hope that most or all of the DKG chapters will eventually participate in raising money not only for books in Tonasunoa Elementary but for other schools like Tainono Elementary School in Ghana. Margie said that Alpha Iota will be able to bring "Thirst for Learning' bottles to Flatwoods. We will give one to any chapter that wants to par-Next year at our ticipate.
