## West Virginia State Members Attend International Conferences

Global Awareness July 30 – August 1, 2019 Mashantucket, Connecticut

Delta Kappa Gamma members who attended the Global Awareness International Conference were emerged in sessions, activities, and personal interactions that raised awareness of a variety of cultures. During the Connecticut Night event, Donna Dufresne, an educational consultant from Connecticut, portrayed Prudence Crandall. Prudence Crandall was a teacher and activist who, in 1832, admitted a 17 year-old African-American student into her private school for white girls. Although this action brought hardships into her life, in 1995, Prudance Crandall was designated the "State's Official Heroine" by the **Connecticut General Assembly.** Follow this link to learn more about a woman whose actions were a "precursor to the landmark U.S. Supreme Court Case Brown v Board of Education (1954)."

Later in the evening, members were entertained by *Flamingo Big Band*, a 14 women, mostly educators, ensemble that played "lively and spirited music." Big band music was part of American history as musicians brought joy into the hearts of people during the Great Depression and World War II. The melodies had DKG members singing along and dancing in the aisles.

Members who registered for the pre-conference seminar at the Mashantucket Pequot Museum and Research Center learned about the Pequot Tribal Nation. During the visit, members toured the facility with a Pequot Tribal member who gave first-hand accounts of the lives of Indigenous peoples. He was wellversed in the history of the tribe and was able to recount events of the past and their relationship to the present. Each display included mannequins of Pequot tribal members based on real-life people. Participants were treated to a variety of Pequot foods and had an opportunity to visit the gift shop. Many West Virginia educators will recognize the name, Marion Blumenthal Lazan. Mrs. Lazan is a World War II Holocaust survivor. Her mission is to educate listeners to the need for respect and acceptance of people of all cultures. She does this by talking about her experiences in a concentration camp during the Holocaust. Her book, Four Perfect Pebbles: A HOLOCAUST STORY, helps to spread her recollections of a horrendous time in the world. Marion speaks from her heart and leaves the listener with thoughts

The 2019 Educators Book Award was announced. Eve L. Ewing wrote **Ghosts in the Schoolyard.** This is an account of the "racism and school closings on Chicago's South Side." Ms. Ewing joined the conference through a video presentation to thank DKG for recognizing her work as worthy of the Educators Book Award.

About 100 DKG members participated in a fundraiser for the DKG Emergency Fund. They gathered at the Bingo Hall in the Foxfire Resort. Three of our ladies were lucky enough to shout, "BINGO!" and take winnings home with them. In 2018 – 2019, DKG members received a total of \$74,000 to help them recover from devastation. Any DKG member who is facing adversity from disasters such as floods or fires may apply for help by contacting International Headquarters.

Workshop topics included DKG publications, International speaker information, Educational Excellence, scholarships, and nondues revenue. Global exploration encompassed a school in Ghana, travels through Europe, and an archaeological dig in the Middle East. Educational matters dealt with young storytellers and saving the elephants. There was something for everyone...so many topics, so little time! International Conferences and Conventions open windows to the impact of Delta Kappa Gamma on members, educational environments, communities, and the world. Women educators are united, honored and stimulated when they come together. 
