

On Saturday, April 30th, we are having the Leadership Conference at the Flatwoods Convention Center. If you are a member of WVSO Delta Kappa Gamma, then you are a leader! This meeting is designed not only to train chapter officers. For one hour that day we will be focused on training officers, but there is so much more to offer to WVSO members.

The conference will begin Friday evening with a social for all attendees. Many of you remember Frances Witten and know that her fund covers the cost of the gold chain for the WVSO Achievement Award as well as a stipend for the yearly socials. When you have finished you need to email it to International mem@dkg.org, to our state treasurer, Deloris Lipps deljlipps@gmail.com, and to me at wvelac_2000@hotmail.com.

Then, in February of each year, you need to go to the International Website if you have had a death in your chapter and go to Reports—Chapter Necrology Report which is Form 2. This is a year end summary that needs to be sent to the state second vice-president and to your chapter president.

Next year at the convention we will be honoring the members we have lost. Please watch the Newsette each time for the list of White Roses to make sure that we are not missing anyone.

DKG LEADERSHIP: FEAR NOT!

In order for any organization, including DKG, to remain thriving, achieving, and impactful, leadership is vital. The organization needs members at the ready to step into leadership roles at the local, state, and international levels.

Why are some members afraid to say "yes" to the opportunity to serve DKG in a leadership role? Perhaps the reluctance of some to accept potential leadership opportunities is rooted in three fears easily overcome.

Fear 1: "I am not qualified. Other members are much more qualified." The Roosevelt adage, "Comparison is the thief of joy," applies in many areas of life, including leadership. An honest self-assessment may indeed lead one to conclude they are not the most qualified. However, members grow in their individual experience and qualification as they accept leadership responsibilities and demonstrate lifelong-learner attributes. Leaders of chapters, state committees, or international endeavors have multiple resources available to them for guidance, support, and training. Stop waiting to feel "ready" or "most qualified." Reflect on the society's vision statement. "Empowering Leaders: Impacting Education Worldwide." This lays clear the empowering nature of leadership. Many enthusiastic mentors will rally around, support, and encourage emerging DKG leaders to navigate challenges of all sorts. The society empowers leaders, and in turn, leaders impact education and the world. A perfect and specific example of leadership growth, opportunity, and support can be found in the DKG Ignite program.

Fear #2: "I don't have the time. I can't travel for meetings." Members of DKG tend to be very involved in their local schools and communities because they are local leaders; intelligent, inspiring, and dynamic. Time is certainly finite. However, 21st century technology provides leaders and teams with tools to streamline and make work efficient and respective of time. The utilization of Zoom and other video conferencing tools have made it easier and more efficient to meet than ever before. Geography, inclement weather, busy schedules, and even the challenges of a pandemic have seen DKG members around the world meeting via teleconference. Hybrid options can be provided to those unable to travel. Using shared electronic documents, members can collaboratively author documents and presentations with ease. Electronic documents have also eliminated the need to "reinvent the wheel" with each new biennium. Emerging leaders can easily access the electronic documents of seasoned leaders, and this information can be shared quickly with stakeholders, using RemindMe, text, and Facebook groups. Cumulatively, these tech tools reduce the time needed to lead effectively.

Fear #3 "I may make mistakes or even fail." Even the most accomplished and competent leaders in the history of the world made errors. Their leadership experience was fortified as they learned from those mistakes and changed course. Regrouping, finding workable solutions, and flexibility are all marks of a growing leader. A mistake or failure doesn't determine an end only the beginning of the next best solution and opportunity for personal and professional growth.

Fears can paralyze the ability to grow and develop leadership skills, individually and corporately. With confidence, be encouraged by the current and past generations of strong women leaders in education that buoyed Delta Kappa Gamma Society International in its efforts to impact education worldwide. Seek out leadership trainings, opportunities, and personal mentors.

We even learned remotely how to video tape ourselves reading a children's book out loud and then sent the video electronically to the City Mission along with a hard copy of the book. Now that was a challenge! Because we were using Zoom, we were able to have 8 meetings – one more meeting than we normally have in a year.

In September 2021 we were determined to meet face to face, so

after most were vaccinated, and later boosted, we donned our masks to meet at a local outdoor shelter. We brought our own dinners and met our scholarship winner, inducted a new member and installed new officers (a year late!) For the next two months we met indoors in large (ish) areas still wearing our masks. But when the Omicron surge hit, we decided not to gather for our annual holiday get together. We went back to our Zoom meeting in February 2022 and had a great turnout with 17 members participating. We hope to meet face to face (isn't that strange to say – "face to face" when for so long we took it for granted?) in a meeting room at the Pizza Village Inn in Point Pleasant in March. So, if nothing else, we've learned to be flexible and thankful for the internet, the telephone and the Post Office and especially the scientific community for coming up with vaccines and masks so we can get back to being with each other "face to face" again.
