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KEYNOTE SPEAKERS ANNOUNCED FOR APRIL 25th SPRING CONFERENCE

Dr. Glenda Wait, WV State President, is pleased to announce that the Keynote Speakers for "The Culture of Collaboration" Spring Conference are Randi Downs and Kathy Houghton. Their keynote address is entitled "We Are Better Together" and will deal with what it means when a community collaborates around a shared vision.

Randi Downs is a teacher trainer and instructional coach for the Onondaga-Cortland-Madison BOCES in the Syracuse NY area. She is also a licensed trainer for the International Institute of Restorative Practices as well as a member of the <u>PBLWorks</u> <u>National Faculty</u>. Randi travels around the country facilitating She will also briefly explore the practices educators use to create relationships with students and each other while fostering safe learning communities. Participants will have the opportunity to hear how Restorative Practices, if used consistently, has the power to change culture.

Kathy Houghton is the **Executive Director at Literacy New** York, a statewide agency that provides training and technical assistance to a network of volunteer literacy programs, as well as professional development to classroom teachers and administrators. Her years of experience in non-profit management and adult education include providing workshops in volunteer management, nonprofit administration, reading, writing, learning disabilities and English for Speakers of Other Languages

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A Note from the President...

Grit and Growth

During my chapter visitations, I have been talking about growth mindset, as it relates to the twenty-five chapters of West Virginia State Delta Kappa Gamma. Growth is as much about experimenting as it is about plowing forward. I realize that there is a significant factor that has to be considered when we are seeking new members and new ideas to grow our chapters. That factor is grit.

There are five characteristics that can be associated with grit and all of us can develop grit when reaching out to our members and possible new members. These are courage, conscientiousness, perseverance, resilience and passion.

An example of courage would be taking a chance as a DKG member to reach out and invite others to join you in supporting women educators and staying the course when others are ready to abandon the ship. Women leaders are best suited to help and support other women leaders, and we have to be conscientious to do so. Conscientiousness is having the desire to do tasks well and not resting until the task is done right. Conscientious people stick to their convictions and are determined to make their chapter a more professional organization by demanding meaningful activities that provide a balance of collaboration, community service and social activities.

The struggle to strengthen and grow your chapter will be fruitful. What is your chapter doing to reinvent itself? Five or ten minutes of active listening each meeting will pay rich rewards. Persevere! Persevering often makes the difference between success and failure. Long term goals for your chapter provide a framework for the context and value of your efforts. Perseverance means starting and continuously moving steadfastly on the path to chapter goals.

Resilience is "toughness". As chapter members and leaders, make every effort to approach chapter growth with a sense of optimism and humor. Believe that the difficulties your chapter may be experiencing represent the stepping stones for revitalization and growth. Do not compare your chapter to other chapters, but learn from them. The extent that new members are interested in listening and sharing new ideas often is a measure of the grit they have developed in current and previous interactions with your chapter members. Provide each educator with the experiences she needs in order to collaborate with others and see herself as a productive member of your chapter.

It is important that we understand where the different generations represented in our chapters are coming from. Connecting with current and prospective members has more to do with our spirit than our age.

Endeavor to be passionate as educators, chapter members and leaders. Passion makes the difference between mediocrity and excellence. Accept that your chapter is both imperfect and growing at the same time. Passionate people do not let anything or anyone stop them from being oriented toward results. Embrace passion and be enthusiastic about the future of DKG.

Be Heard

Have you heard of Phyllis Rossiter? In 1969, she was one of the few women enrolled in a graduate program in Science at Yale. (It was in 1969 all Ivy League institutions allowed women to enroll.) She has made it her life's work to recognize the efforts of women in the areas of Science. Her study, "Women Scientists of America", has brought hundreds of forgotten or buried contributions of women scientists to light.

Perhaps we have become complacent in remembering trailblazing women like Annie Webb Blanton and the other 11 founders of Delta Kappa Gamma. Meeting under assumed names for fear of losing their jobs, they founded The Delta Kappa Gamma Society on May 11, 1929. The Greek name was to conceal the purpose of the society, founded to fill the needs of women in educational professions. It was not an easy task to form a society for women educators when the culture only allowed women to meet for social reasons. Only nine It took until 1978 to enact a law dealing with Pregnancy Discrimination. In 1973, women could still be denied credit cards by some banks. In 1973, all 50 states finally allowed women to serve on juries. In 1994, the Violence Against Women Act was passed. Our members are encouraged to research women's rights history.

As DKG member, what are we willing to do today to further these rights and make our voices heard? What issues do you have with retirement, childcare, your schools, medical care, or issues in our local, state, and national governments? DKG members can be involved in offering workable solutions.

Let us not forget the bold women of DKG. Let us follow in their footsteps in contributing positive changes for women everywhere. Recently I came across a Facebook post that really spoke to me. No one was credited as the author, but many could have written it. Accessibility is being able to get in the building.

Diversity is getting invited to the table.

Inclusion is having a voice at the table.

Belonging is having your voice heard.



once again been raised. Delta Kappa Gamma is classified as a 501c(6) organization which means we do not pay federal income tax but we must pay sales tax. This also means we are not eligible to participate in many of the programs that award grants (such as the one from Walmart) or give rewards (like the Kroger program) since they are usually limited to 501c(3) organizations. organization financially. Because Delta Kappa Gamma gives money back to its members (scholarships are an example of this), the society does not qualify as a 501c(3). International does have some foundations (the Educational Foundation and the Supporting Corporation) which are 501c(3) foundations. This makes contributions to them tax deductible. These foundations are funded through donations rather than membership dues.

During the event an orientation for parents is presented to emphasize the importance of reading aloud to their child. After that books and blankets are distributed to each child. Parents and child settles down to enjoy their new book. Members are on hand to fill in if a parent is unable to attend the event. Each child takes the book and blanket home to keep.
