WEST VIRGINIA STATE DELTA KAPPA GAMMA CONVENTION 2021 April 23 & 24,2021

"Yes, WV DKG Members, there will be a 2021 State Convention."

You are invited to our first West Virginia State virtual convention!

Dr. Glenda Wait, the 2019 – 2021 WV State president, has been working diligently with the convention host chapter planning committee from Beta, Tau, and Alpha lota to create a virtual convention filled with enough tradition to soothe our souls, enough business to get things done, and more than enough member involvement to make everyone feel an integral part of this special event. Your input is not only wanted, but is essential to making this convention extra special, extra engaging, and extraordinary.

Sara Sweeney, Epsilon DKG member and director of graduate studies at West Liberty University, will facilitate the virtual convention using Zoom. During registration, you will need to provide an email address to enable Sara to send you an invitation for the convention sessions. You will be able to register electronically by using the QR code provided or to register through the USPS. Only one form of registration is required. (Please note that there is NOT a registration fee. Donations can be made to the WV DKG State disaster or scholarship funds. See details on the registration form.)

Knowing that not everyone has a device for joining the convention, members could invite those without access to meet with them. Small groups should be very safe and will provide support to those who are not comfortable with the technology. Each person should register individually. Due to the risks of Covid-19, Dr. Wait and the convention planning committee chose to move from an in-person event to an online event.

A detailed schedule will be printed in the spring Newsette. Plan to tune in to the Friday night social on April 23 at 7:00 P.M. Pull up a chair and be entertained and informed through *History Alive!*, a program under the West Virginia Humanities Council. Our historical guest speaker will be "Nellie Bly," an American journalist, industrialist, inventor, and charity worker. She will share many aspects of her life and you will be able to ask questions to learn even more about her. You might even draw comparisons between her soul and yours. Be sure to attend so you have a chance to win a theme-related door prize!

Following the historical presentation, Dr. Wait will host an opening session. During that time, you will be given a "first virtual convention participant" orientation to help with procedures and technology for the Saturday sessions. (Due to the possibility of hackers invading the convention, it is extremely important that you do not share the Zoom link with anyone.)

One purpose of this convention will be to accomplish all business including finances and the election of officers. Publications participants and scholarship and achievement award recipients will be recognized. Nita Scott, the DKG International Executive Director, will speak during the convention. Officers for the 2021 – 2023 biennium will be installed. A detailed schedule will be available in the spring Newsette and will be posted on the state website as soon as it is available.

Family members and friends became ill. Chapter visitations, my husband and I enjoyed last year while traveling throughout our beautiful state of West Virginia were taken off the calendar. Wherever we went, we were welcomed and treated warmly, and I miss talking and sharing about DKG over refreshments or dinner. Yes, we've lost a lot, but what if we were to focus on and become more aware of positive happenings in our families and organizations because of the pandemic?

On my birthday in April, I was connected with children, grandchildren and great grandchildren across several states and Costa Rica. How to Report the Death of a Member

Two things must occur once a member passes.

First, a Form 6 must be completed. This form can be found on the DGK.org website once a member signs in. It is found under "Forms", then "Membership". You should include as much information as possible, especially positions held by the deceased member. A copy is sent to International Headquarters, the WV State Membership Chair (the Second Vice President) and the WV State Treasurer.

Second, a Form 2 (Chapter Necrology Annual Report) should be completed by February 1st of each year. This can be found on the DKG.org website under "Reports." This form is submitted to the State Membership Chair, the Chapter President, and one is maintained in the Chapter File.

Deceased members should be remembered by their chapter in a special ceremony. There are many ways to honor the life of a DKG member but the International Society has a nice variety of resources. Of course, you can customize your own remembrance as well.
